One lucky student group got to meet Pokey up close and personal, during a live morning news cast at CBS8/KFMB-TV studios.

For a group presentation on the digital presence of media brands, Professor Nicola Bridges (Comm Buzz #5), took her class to CBS8/KFMB, the San Diego Union-Tribune, and Sharecare, Inc. Sharecare is the top online health engagement platform founded by Jeff Arnold, former founder of WebMD, and Dr. Oz, cardiologist and Emmy Award-winning TV host, where Bridges was previously Senior Vice President of Content, PR & Marketing.

### Nicole Assisi ('04)

Dr. Nicole Tempel Assisi is an accomplished leader in 21st century education. Originally from Germany, Dr. Assis is fluent in Spanish, Portuguese and German and worked in television in both the United States and Europe before going into education. Dr. Assisi taught in the San Diego Unified School District and at High Tech High before becoming a founding team member for Camino Nuevo Charter Academy, the Da Vinci Schools, and Thrive Public Schools. Under her leadership, Da Vinci earned widespread recognition for their rigorous and innovative

programs, including funding from Hewlett, Gates, Belkin, Northrop and others.

Thrive Public Schools, where Dr. Assis serves as the CEO, is a new Charter Management Organization focused on high quality staff provingstudents from diverse backgrounds project-based, blended learning options. Like DaVinci before it, Thrive is flourishing under Dr. Assis's leadership. Her approach has received recognition as a State Approved Charter School, one of the Top 100 Schools in the Nation worth visiting, a Model for Next Generation Learning and a leader in professional development for district in charter schools in San Diego. At the core of what Thrive does is a strong desire to end segregation in schools by bringing people from all over San Diego together in one school. Parents choose thrive because

it offers children safe and joyful learning opportunities and lets children learn and grow at their own pace.


Dr. Assisi is a frequent speaker at statewide and regional conferences on charter schools and education reform and currently teaches and mentors new charter school leaders as a professor for the Charter School Policy, Finance, and Administration Certificate Program at UCLA and the Charter and Autonomous School Leadership Academy at Cal State Dominguez Hills. She earned her Master's Degrees in K-12 Literacy



from the University of San Diego and in Educational Leadership from Point Loma Nazarene University, as well as her Doctorate in Educational Leadership from the University of Southern California Rossier School of Education. She also holds several Administrative and Teaching credentials and certificates. Dr. Assisi was a board member for the Goethe International Charter School and also serves on the Advisory Board for the UCLA Extension Program.

As Dr. Assisi puts it, "Running a school requires the art of communication." Most of her day as a CEO is spent connecting with families, staff, elected officials and community members. It was her belief in the power of communication that allowed her to gracefully navigate the barrage of political challenges that arose at the in response to Thrive's initial charter petition. While it was no easy feat to bring disparate sides together in conversation, doing so is one of Assisi's favorite tasks. She attributes much of her success to great mentors at USD who prepared her for the work, and to the many young learners who need her to be their voice.

At USD, Margaux worked for USD TV, where she had the opportunity to interview many Toreros' athletes, including present Chicago Cub Kris Bryant. She also interned at the Fox affiliate in Sacramento, KUSI-TV in San Diego and Fox Sports San Diego. "My internships were vital
