### Sigma Tau Delta: November 2020 Enrollment Period for the **International English Honor Society!**

Sigma Tau Delta, the International English Honor Society, invites qualified English majors and minors to apply to join their fellow students in this lively organization. Sigma Tau Delta offers competitive scholarships for both undergraduate and graduate students; sponsors and organizes events at USD -- such as a student ball, a student conference, poetry readings, and the Sonnetathon; and provides leadership opportunities for our English majors and minors. Membership in Sigma Tau Delta also offers students opportunities to publish their writing in Sigma Tau's undergraduate research and creative writing journals and to attend Sigma Tau's annual student research conference; membership also confers a pin and stole that you may wear with distinction at commencement and cherish as mementos of your scholarly work and the friendships you made in English classes and through Sigma Tau Delta activities. Since, membership in Sigma Tau Delta is for a lifetime, students gain access to professional contacts, networks, and mentoring post-graduation as well.

Students with a GPA of 3.4 or higher in their English classes, and 3.0 or higher cumulative GPA, are eligible to apply for membership in Sigma Tau Delta. Students who are then deemed to be eligible will receive an email-invitation directly from Sigma Tau Delta with instructions on how to self-enroll via their website. For lifetime membership, there is a one-time fee of \$45 paid directly to the national Sigma Tau Delta organization (payable by credit card on their website) plus a one-time fee of \$45 to join the local USD chapter. New members will be formally inducted into Sigma Tau Delta at a spring 2021 ceremony; at that time the new chapter officers for 2021-22 will also be selected.




**Anna Scharrer,** Senior ('21), Philosophy and French majors

Anna's Pick: Collected Sonnets: Edna St. Vincent Millay

Edna St. Vincent Millay is always seeming to get herself into trouble with a fickle and mischievous heart that is so fun to unpack in her poetry. She frequently uses images from Antiquity to craft poems about love (found and lost), la joie de vivre, music, the divine, intimacy, and death. Her grounded treatment of lofty subjects juxtaposed with the traditional love sonnet form is one of her greatest achievements throughout her 180 sonnets. My favorites in this collection include: "What lips my lips have kissed, and where, and why," "Heart, have no pity on this house of bone," and "No rose that in a garden ever grew."







Mei's Pick: The Song of Achilles - Madeline Miller

"If you've read Circe and liked it then you'll definitely love The Song of Achilles by Madeline Miller. It's a coming of age novel and a historical reconstruction of the Greek myth, except it's told from the perspective of Patroclus, Achilles' closest friend...or maybe something more. There's a great blend of love, strength, and consequences of war that affects all the characters and their interactions. It's like reading Percy Jackson as a grown up; there's so much realness to the characters. 10/10 would recommend!"





Olivia Hunt, Senior ('21), English major Olivia's Pick: "Life Support: 100 poems to reach for on dark nights is one of my favorite anthologies because its poems are thought-provoking without requiring any serious mental gymnastics. They're beautiful and soothing and, I think most importantly, unpretentious. They won't judge the trail of Doritos crumbs down your shirt or express disappointment when you re-watch that season of 90 Day Fiancé for the 3rd time. But what they will do is improve your mood. These poems aren't entirely happy, but sometimes reading sad poems is the best catharsis you can have."

Olivia's Pick: "Two arresting reads: War and Peace by Count Leo Tolstoy and The Thorn Birds by Colleen McCullough. War and Peace has an intimidating reputation, but do not be discouraged. A novel that takes on human nature at its depths, War and Peace covers a plethora of subjects: history, philosophy, sociology, psychology, and even mathematics and physics. It's worth every page. As for the Thorn Birds, it's a novel you will never forget. Set in Australia, it involves an ambitious priest, an eccentric rich woman, and a beautiful young girl and her immigrant family from New Zealand. McCullough is a genius storyteller."
