



Johns Hopkins Undergraduate Humanities Research Symposium

Students, apply for Johns Hopkins University's second annual Richard Macksey National Undergraduate Humanities Research Symposium. The symposium was designed to offer students across the country the chance to gather together and disseminate their humanities

research on a national scale. COVID forced us to adapt to a virtual event, but that in turn was a great success, with 359 participants and more than 10,000 visits to the conference site to date. This year's event will be virtual as well, held live on April 24th and 25th, 2021, and our application portal is now open.

This symposium is open to undergraduate students from any two-year or four-year college or university who would like to present their original scholarship in the humanities. We hope to have 400 participants this year. In addition to the multiple panels of student papers and presentations (including original creative works), we will also have a wonderful keynote delivered by Pulitzer Prize-winning author Anthony Doerr and multiple pro-



fessional development panels featuring Johns Hopkins graduate students and faculty and editors from Johns Hopkins University Press. Students studying all areas of the humanities are welcome to attend. Attendees will also have the opportunity to work with our student editors to revise their presentation into a journal-

length presentation for our journal of proceedings, the Macksey Journal.

Internship Opportunities on Handshake

Some are paid and some are not, but all opportunities below qualify for English academic units because they require writing and/or research. Always apply as early as possible, as many positions are filled prior to a deadline. Current opportunities on Handshake include:

• Two part-time, remote, unpaid internships for Los Angelesbased mxdwn.com as Music Features Writer (application deadline March 15) and as Hard Rock Album Reviewer (application deadline June 1); and

• A part-time, remote, unpaid internship as a Climate Advocacy Intern for San Diego-based Citizens' Climate Lobby (application deadline April 1).

Apply for a Summer Internship Award



Apply soon for summer funding to support your research experience, volunteer opportunity, or summer internship. The Summer Internship Award, provided by the Career Development Center, awards up to \$3000 (disbursed in three payments) to offset living, accommodation, and other expenses associated with professional development opportunities. You must have a position already secured before you apply. Applications are being accepted now, and the <u>deadline to apply is Sunday, May 2</u> for Summer 2021.

To be eligible, applicants may be neither incoming freshmen nor outgoing seniors, and they must be enrolled full-time at the University of San Diego (or in a USD study abroad program) in the fall following the summer opportunity. Eligible internships and opportunities must be at least 6 weeks in duration and at least 240 hours. • Summer Music Editorial Internship, Fulltime, National Public Radio (Remote), Paid: \$15/hr. Duties include: web production for a wide array of stories, including segments from NPR's news shows, public radio music stations, podcasts, original essays by staff and freelancers, and special editorial packages; assisting NPR Music's audience strategist with social planning and scheduling; transcribing, fact-



checking and editing interviews; adapting broadcast pieces for presentation as dynamic web articles; improving copy that falls below NPR editorial standards; crafting compelling headlines and promotional language. Application deadline: February 26, 2021. Apply on Handshake.

• Summer Content Design Internship, Fulltime, Intuit, Inc. (Remote), Unpaid. Duties include: partnering closely with product and visual designers to build easy-to-use products that solve real problems for real people; transform complex technical jargon into conversational, approachable language; craft UI text, product messaging, landing pages, emails, and other project deliverables. Application deadline: February 22, 2021. Apply on Handshake.

• If you are an English Major/Minor and you are looking for a summer opportunity that would qualify for the award, consider teaching English abroad. Employers may not offer to cover airfare, other travel costs, or visa fees, but Career Dev's Summer Internship Award could cover those costs if you apply. A valuable resource for finding teaching abroad positions is Dave's ESL Café (<u>http://</u><u>www.eslcafe.com/jobs/</u>) where you can post your resume and search the job board using criteria to narrow your results by geographical region, qualification requirements, and compensation. Most positions include board and accommodations. Although some positions require that you have a Teaching English as a Foreign Language (TEFL) certificate, it is possible to find positions without one.



CHR Book Club




Japanese American Evacuation Day of Remembrance

February 19th is Japanese American Evacuation Day of Remembrance.

The Day of Remembrance is a day of observance for the internment of Japanese Americans during World War II. Events in numerous U.S. states, especial-



ly in the West Coast, are held on or near February 19, the day in 1942 that Executive Order 9066 was signed by President Franklin D. Roosevelt, requiring internment of all Americans of Japanese ancestry.



Want to learn more? Read the graphic novel "They Called Us Enemy" by George Takei (of Star Trek fame). Takei experienced the internment camps first hand as a child.
