### SURE Scholar Award

**Emma Heflin**, a first-year student and soon-to-be English major, was awarded a competitive SURE (Summer Undergraduate Research Experience) Grant from USD's Office of Undergraduate research. Emma's

research project -- "'Is black so base a hue?' Race and Representation in Four Plays by Shakespeare" -- studies and critiques Shakespeare's engagement with colonialist propaganda and with emergent notions of white European supremacy in the late 16th and early 17th centuries. Through the lens of WEB DuBois' concept of "Double-Consciousness," Emma's project further examines the corrosive effects of Shakespeare's racialized dramatic



discourse on several characters' self-concepts. Maura Giles-Watson will serve as faculty mentor for Emma's summer research project.

The Summer Undergraduate Research Experience (SURE) is an educational summer research program that supports USD undergraduates to engage in research, scholarly activities and creative works for up to 10 weeks during the summer. The SURE application is student-driven-- students identify a faculty mentor and topic of inquiry and formulate a project proposal in collaboration with the faculty mentor. 



### Lending Libraries: Open and Read

The Open and Read project started out as an idea back in the Spring of 2017. The members of the *Alcalá Review* looked for a way to foster the journal's relationship with the English department, as well as the USD community at large. We wanted to find a way to share our appreciation for literature with others, and be exposed to new works through contributions from the community.

Thus, the Open and Read project was born. Using the many lending libraries around the United States today as inspiration, we looked to create libraries across campus, where USD students could take a book donated from the community in exchange for one of their own. Through these libraries, we hoped that USD students would be exposed to works of literature outside of the their comfort zone.

My dad, Rick, and I began building the libraries over the Summer of 2017. With support from Dr. Williams and the Changemaker's Hub, we designed and built two libraries with the intent on putting them into action in the following academic year. My dad was a major contributor to these libraries, and he was instrumental in bringing them into existence. He helped me through early design challenges, and through the toughest stages of construction.

When it came to getting the libraries on campus, Dr. Black and Dr. Williams were instrumental in working with Mary Whelan from University

Design and the Facilities Department to find the best place on campus for the libraries. Additionally, Dr. Black and the staff at the Alcalá Review supported the libraries by populating them with books and working to educate the USD community on how the libraries worked.

### Justice, Song, and the City

Need a literature class for Fall 2018? Take Dr. Maese-Cohen's Engl 321-02 Literature of Race, Gender, and Sexuality: **Justice, Song, and the City from Plato to Kendrick Lamar**, offered on MW 4-5:20pm. CRN# 2935.

In The Republic (380BC), Plato links the good city with good human behavior, setting the stage for contemporary debates concerning the relation between ethics, aesthetics, and politics. Our close-reading of this foundational text of Western philosophy will establish a template for understanding how justice, song, and the city inform the contemporary novel, film, and album. We will also trace a genealogy from Plato's "philosopher-king" and "good city" to Kendrick Lamar's "Good Kid" and "M.A.A.D city." Why does Plato consider the poet a dangerous trafficker of untruths? How does expelling poets from the polis establish the philosopher-king as guardian of a just community? Does the antagonistic relationship between king and poet depend upon an ideology of gender and sexuality? How are we to read the roles of worker, wife, and slave in Plato's republic? Along the way from Plato to Kendrick we will investigate James Baldwin, John Rechy, and Toni Morrison, as well as John Singleton's film Poetic Justice (featuring lyricists Tupac Shakur and Maya Angelou). Students interested in the relation between philosophy, music, and social justice are encouraged to use the interdisciplinary nature of this course to further explore their own interests and perspectives.



### **Barton Thurber: Emeritus Status**

The Board of Trustees of the University of San Diego (USD) recently conveyed professor emeritus status on our very own Dr. Barton (Bart) Thurber. This honor rightly reflects Bart's exceptional record of accomplishments at USD and beyond our borders. In 2012, the *Princeton* 

Review named Bart one of the 300 best teachers in the United States. Bart's willingness to share his knowledge about teaching with others reveals his supportive nature, and love of teaching and learning. Recently, I asked Bart what he found most memorable and beloved about his time at USD, and his immediate answer was teaching, and this love has been deeply and consistently reflected in his roughly 35 years among us. In addition to being an exceptional teacher, Bart's pioneering work on a project called the Center for the Humanities and Technology (CHAT) is as a precursor to the university's focus on the digital humanities, and its collaborative engagement with the Humanities Center. This project, largely foreshadowed by Bart's collaborative work with Dr. Jack Pope (Math) brought to USD a focus on the humanities and technology as early as the 1980s. Bart and Jack developed a software program and course called Cyber Blake, with William Blake's work as its pedagogical focus, with an eye toward understanding what technology could bring to the humanities. And in collaboration Bart created another similarly engaged course with Jim Gump (History), using available technologies to teach about Warsaw, as it existed in the late 1930s, under invasion by Russia and Germany. In summary, Bart's work has been prescient in scope and formative in reach, and we are humbled and honored to call him professor emeritus. Congratulations, Bart!

Bart officially retired from the English Department in December 2012.




### **David Hay Retires**

### **Founders Chapel Tour**






### USD Just Read! Book Announced for 2018-2019

\$2.00 a Day details the struggles of living on virtually no cash income in U.S. society by telling the stories of individuals and families from across the country who somehow do just that. The engaging profiles help readers make emotional connections to the families and highlight how policies and practices make it difficult for these individuals to get the support they need. The book helps to explain what is happening in society to swell the ranks of the \$2-a-day poor and increase income inequality in general, and ends with potential solutions. We hope the book creates dialogue in the USD community around the topics of poverty, income distribution, housing and homelessness, welfare reform, politics, stress, charity, and governmental and business policies that make it difficult for people to find work and make it out of poverty.
