

The Lindsay J. Cropper Memorial Writers Series **Welcomes Kiese Laymon**

Thursday, October 1, 12:30 p.m., Craft Talk and Reading with Kiese Laymon

Kiese Laymon is a Black southern writer from Jackson, Mississippi. In his observant, often hilarious work, Lavmon does battle with the personal and the political: race and family, body and shame, poverty and place. His savage humor and clear-eyed perceptiveness have earned him comparisons to Ta-Nehisi Coates, Alice Walker, and Mark Twain. He is the author of the awardwinning memoir Heavy, the groundbreaking essay collection How to Slowly Kill Yourself and Others in America, and the genre-defying novel Long Division. Lavmon's powerful bestselling memoir, Heavy: An American Memoir, won the 2019 Andrew Carnegie Medal for Excellence in Nonfiction, and the 2018 Christopher Isherwood Prize for Autobiographical Prose, and was named one of the 50 Best Memoirs of the Past 50 Years by The New York Times. It is a nominee for the Hurston/Wright Legacy Award in Nonfiction. Heavy was named a best book of 2018 by the New York Times, Publishers Weekly, NPR,



Broadly, Buzzfeed, The Washington Post, Entertainment Weekly, was named one of the 50 best memoirs since 1969 by The New York Times, and was a finalist for the 2018 Kirkus Prize for Nonfiction. The audiobook, read by the author, was named the Audible 2018 Audiobook of the Year.


Cynthia Caywood's "Journals of a Plague Year: Samuel Pepys, Daniel Defoe, and the Great London Plague of 1665."

English Community Spotlight

In this section, we share what members of the USD English community are doing!



Dr. Tim Randell has taught at USD since 2006. He teaches first year writing, advanced writing, and literature courses, and he serves as Director of the Southeast San Diego Tutoring program and as Coordinator of Careers and Internships for the English Department.

Dr. Randell encourages students to start building a career while at USD by performing an internship. Internships offer the opportunity to gain experience, establish a track record for future opportunities, make professional contacts, and earn professional references and recommendations, all while exploring career paths and earning money. To find an internship, Randell recommends students sign up for Handshake (https://sandiego.joinhandshake.com/login), which offers a customizable search engine (by job field, geographical area, start date, and other criteria), but in addition, he suggests students use a search engine to find dream jobs and then to inquire about internships, as did one recent student who found an internship reviewing science fiction manuscripts at a literary agency. For more information, contact Dr. Randell (trandell@sandiego.edu), who can provide you with a sample syllabus and an internship agreement form, discuss internship opportunities, and register your internship to earn units (ENGL 298/498: Internship). Although students usually must perform duties on-site, remote internships may qualify until after the pandemic subsides.

The Southeast San Diego Tutoring program is another passion of Dr. Randell's, and he invites students to register for the program (ENGL 292/492: Tutoring). Tutors contribute to the community by helping local elementary and middle school kids—many of whom are from lower socio-economic parts of San Diego and from under-represented groups—succeed in reading, writing, and math. This semester partnering schools are welcoming tutors to their remote classroom environments. Students can earn 1, 2, or 3 units a semester over multiple semesters, so the program fits within an already busy schedule. The program is open to all undergraduates, but it might prove especially valuable to those who wish to pursue teaching, coaching, community outreach, or any other work in which it is helpful to have experience working with children.

Dr. Randell teaches and researches the literature and culture of American Modernism, including the Jazz Age and the Harlem Renaissance, and the literature of World War I. His more recent research focuses on the discourses of race, authenticity, and masculinity in the United States. He has a book chapter forthcoming on Langston Hughes's contributions

of poems and song lyrics to a novel by Carl Van Vechten (in the Modern Language Association's *Teaching the Harlem Renaissance*). In addition, he has two articles, one on Carl Van Vechten and one on the 369th Infantry Regiment (the first Black battalion to fight in combat in World War I), forthcoming in a new edition of *The Encyclopedia of the Harlem Renaissance*.

The 2020 Booker Prize Shortlist Is...






Avni Doshi mixes intense empathy with caustic wit in a mother-daughter story where memories are questioned, bonds are tested, and love isn't always enough.



Through the lens of higher academia, Brandon Taylor takes a look at race and queerness in this profound story of intimacy, loneliness, desire and trauma.




In a world ravaged by climate change and a search for a new way of life, Diane Cook paints a picture of a mother's love pitted against the forces of nature.
