


DR. MERCADO *Mixtec Garden* *Linda Vista*

The Communication Studies Department volunteer students have joined Linda Vista Mixtec community representatives for the third consecutive year for planting the Mixtec Garden. This garden is already a very important place for community members and students to gather and exchange knowledge about indigenous agriculture and food systems. Last year the Mixtec community elders turned the garden into an urban milpa. The Milpa is a millenary Mesoamerican way of practicing agriculture by planting diverse crops in a small plot.



Crops like corn, squash, chili peppers, tomatoes and beans are the main yields of a Milpa, along with epazote, quelites, verdolagas, camotes, and other edible and medicinal herbs, making this system diverse, sustainable and good for the soil. Many native communities in the continent have sustained themselves planting milpas, which is also a communal way of practicing diverse agriculture.

Dr. Antonieta Mercado's students Arianna Gonzalez, Lauren Bilcik, Delilah Bishop, Bailey Gillis and Wendy Martinez have been participating in the planting of the garden and collaborating with Mixtec community coordinators Daisy Alonso, Julieta Gonzalez and Margarita Hernandez in creating a shared stories program around the garden. Dr. Kevin Guerrieri, Associate Professor of Spanish and Director of the Latin American Studies Program has also helped Dr. Mercado and her students. The members of the Mixtec community want to preserve this knowledge for the new generations of Mixtec youth who are US born, and for the larger community that have seen their systems of food production affected by migration and displacement.





