FACULTY UPDATES

National Communication Association 2014 Conference

Dr. Bradley Bond will present a paper co-authored with Benjamin Compton ('14), USD Alum. The paper is titled, "Gay on-screen: The relationship between exposure to gay characters on television and heterosexual audiences' endorsement of gay equality."

Dr. Jonathan Bowman is participating in five separate sessions at the 2014 NCA Conference. Most notably, he is co-presenting research with recent graduate Benjamin Compton (now a graduate student at the University of Kansas). That paper is titled "Extradysidic Evaluations: Perceptions of Haptic Interactions Among Same- and Cross-Sex Friends."

Dr. Diane Keeling will present two pieces of research: one on how psychoanalysis has been used in rhetorical criticism entitled, "Conceptualizing Material Rhetoric through Psychoanalytic Approaches to Criticism," and the other on how feral children challenge our conceptions of human nature: "Animal of the Origin."

Dr. Antonieta Mercado will present her research on indigenous Mexican immigrants in the United States from a forthcoming book chapter on a panel: *Globalizing Intercultural Communication: Case Studies and Personal Narratives for the 21st Century*. Mercado, A. (forthcoming, 2015). *Transnational Practices of Communication and Social Justice: Indigenous Mexican Immigrants in the United States*. In Kathryn Sorrells and Sachi Sekimoto (eds.). *Intercultural Communication, Globalization and Social Justice: A Reader*. Sage Publications.

Dr. Jonathan Bowman, Associate Dean and Associate Professor of Communication Studies, has also been selected by the NCA as the 2014 recipient of the Donald H. Ecroyd Award for Outstanding Teaching in Higher Education. The award is given annually to honor an NCA member who exemplifies superlative teaching in higher education. Dr. Keeling also attended the Museum of Man's "Instruments of Torture" exhibit with Communication Major Kaitlyn Wolters as a part of their independent study on the rhetoric of witch-hunts. She will be attending the National Communication Association conference in Chicago, IL, where she will present two pieces of research: one on how psychoanalysis has been used in rhetorical criticism and the other on how feral children challenge our conceptions of human nature.

Dr. Anotnieta Mercado organized a panel on October 18th for the Peace and Justice Studies Association entitled "Decolonizing Conflict Resolution." The panel discussed what conflict resolution looks like from different indigenous perspectives, focusing on different indigenous groups such as Mixtecos, Zapotecos and Rarámuris, and including indigenous migrants from Mexico in the United States. Other panelists included: Dr. Ana Paula Pintado, National School of History and Anthropology, Mexico; Luis López Reséndiz, San Diego City College; and José González, Frente Indígena de Organizaciones Binacionales, San Diego.



Drs Eric Pierson and Roger Pace presented a paper entitled, "Festival Going as a High Impact Practice in the Undergraduate Film Curriculum" at the *Teachers, Teaching and the Media* conference on October 17th. The paper was an examination of the educational benefits of film festivals and was based in part the professor's experience taking students to the Sundance Film Festival. The Sundance class is being offered for the eleventh time in Intersession, 2015. The conference was held at St. Marys College of California. Pictured below are Drs. After wrapping up my master's degree in journalism at Columbia University's Graduate School of Journalism, I accepted a summer internship with CNN's investigative unit in New York. I helped pursue stories ranging from the Veterans' Administration wait list scandal to the NFL through research, screening archival tapes, and intense research. At the end of my internship, I was offered a freelance news assistant position with the New York bureau, which covers daily and breaking news in the northeast region. In my new role (which I just started on Monday!) I've helped on stories ranging from ISIS to the ebola outbreak.

I couldn't have gotten to this point, though, without the support of professors like Prof. Gina Lew and Dr. del Río, who always supported my journalistic ventures while I was at USD.



Favorite classes in particular included Dr. del Río's Media and Conflict class in Paris and Prof. Lew's Advanced Journalism class. In particular, Prof. Lew's deadline writing exercises prepped me well for covering breaking news efficiently - very helpful in both grad school and in my jobs since. The practice I received in journalism, too, from writing for *The Vista* and working on USD Radio were crucial in building my skills as a reporter. 



This presentation explores how recent media production combines two traditions that have been separate for almost forty years now: Journalism and Documentaries. Journalism has been fighting for survival in the digital world, while documentaries have been focusing on its narrative and subjective possibilities rather than working on its informative function. Dig data, informatics, and web based production make these two non-fictional traditions collide, work together, and expand in a moment of media convergence and social practices redefinition.
