

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



United Nations Convention on the Law of the Sea (UNCLOS)

- Treaty text (1833 U.N.T.S. 397)
 - Available on <u>HeinOnline</u> or <u>United Nations Treaty Series</u> database
- Negotiating history
 - The most "official" source for negotiating history of UNCLOS is *The Negotiating Process Of The Third United Nations Conference On The Law Of The Sea*, in UNITED NATIONS CONVENTION ON THE LAW OF THE SEA 1982: A COMMENTARY, VOL. 1 which we have in print in the LRC. This set is divided by article in vol 2-7 so article 207 is in volume 4 with a list of UN sources and commentary for that article.
 - Also very useful is the <u>United Nations Conference on the Law of the Sea, Official Records of Diplomatic Conferences</u> website.
- Secondary sources

United States-Mexico-Canada Agreement (USMCA) & Implementation Act

Official text

- Because the USMCA is so recent, it is not yet in an official treaty series, can refer to the Office of the USTR's website.

- USMCA Implementation Act For a negotiating history of PL 116-113 use our domestic databases Proquest Congressional and Legislative Insight which both have substantial materials on the negotiating history of the Act.

Secondary sources

- <u>CRS report</u> that discusses environmental protection generally.

Foreign Law Guide


- The Foreign Law Guide is an essential resource in researching the laws of another country.
- For each country, the FLG provides a brief overview to the law of the country, laws arranged by subject, English translations, and scholarly commentary.

Foreign Websites

- Use Google translate!
 - To directly translate foreign websites instead of using the English 'portal' (usually a pared down version of the full website)
 - To generate keywords to search websites or Google in the original language.

Romanization

For romanization of Korean sources, use the official romanization system released by the Korean government in 2000, available at http://www.mcst.go.kr/english/koreaInfo/language/romanization.jsp. Available but not used here are the ALA-LC Romanization Tables: Transliteration Schemes for Non-Roman Scripts that were approved by the Library of Congress and the American Library Association, which continue to follow the McCune-Reischauer system as of 2008, available at http://www.loc.gov/catdir/cpso/romanization/korean.pdf.

Cases

Citation format: <case number>, <date</pre>
of decision>, (<volume number> <reporter abbreviation>, <first page>, <page(s) of specific material, if desired>) (<country abbreviation if not evident from context>).

Reporter abbreviation, volume number, and page numbers are not common in Korean citation practice, but if available, add such information.

- Constitutional Court [Const. Ct.]. 2004Hun-Ma554 & 556 (consol.). Oct. 21, 2004. (2004 DKCC, 11) (S. Kor.).
- Seoul High Court [Seoul High Ct.], 95Na14840, Sept. 18, 1966 (S. Kor.).
- Incheon District Court [Dist. Ct.], 2004Ga-Hap8803, Dec. 14, 2004 (S. Kor.).

Daebeobwon (S. Ct.) (Supreme Court): Cite to JIP, GONG, or SCD, if therein; Hunbeob jaepanso (Const. Ct.) (Constitutional Court: court of original and final jurisdiction to determine the constitutionality of laws): Cite to KCCR, KCCG, or DKCC, if therein; Godeung beobwon (High Ct.) (high courts) and Jibang beobwon (Dist. Ct.) (district courts): Cite to GODEUNG JIP, GAKGONG, or HAJIP, if therein, adding the location of the court before the name.

Specialized jurisdiction: Teukheo beobwon (Pat. Ct.) (patent court), Haengjeong beobwon (Admin. Ct.) (administrative courts), and Gajeong beobwon (Fam. Ct.) (family courts).
